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"This Joyful Eastertide, Away with sin and sorrow! My love, the Crucified, has sprung to life this morrow, Had Christ, who once was slain, not burst His three-day prison, our faith had been in vain: But now has Christ arisen, arisen, arisen!" (LSB #482 v. 1)

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

You might be reading this before we gather to shout those glorious words in church on Easter Sunday, and that's just fine. Let these lines stir your heart with anticipation for the joy that awaits us. Easter isn't like any other celebration, it's the heartbeat of our faith.

As the hymn says, Easter isn't just a single day of joy; it's a season—*Eastertide*—stretching 50 days long! One day simply isn't enough to contain the magnitude of Christ's victory. Without His resurrection, as St. Paul echoes in 1 Corinthians 15:14, our faith would be empty. But Christ *has* risen, and because He lives, we too will rise with Him to eternal life. That's why we'll keep singing Easter hymns every Sunday through June 1st this year. Some might find that odd, but that's OK. We'll keep rejoicing in our Savior's triumph.

Eastertide has its own rhythm. The first three Sundays spotlight the risen Jesus appearing to His disciples, proving He's truly alive, body and all, while teaching them what His resurrection means. He sends them out with the forgiveness He's given them and unlocks the Old Testament to show how He's fulfilled it, equipping them to preach this good news.

Then, on the Fourth Sunday, we celebrate Good Shepherd Sunday. Jesus, our risen Shepherd, tends and feeds us, His sheep, not just for now, but forever. What comfort!

The final three weeks shift our gaze forward. We move from reflecting on Easter's events to anticipating the Holy Spirit, whom Jesus promised to send after His ascension. This year, we'll hear how Jesus has welcomed us into His Holy family, telling us that God the Father has claimed us as His own. United to Christ, our brother, we're kept safe until He returns to bring us home in glory.

That's a lot to unpack, and even more to celebrate! So even after the Easter baskets are stashed away and the candy's long gone, we'll still be savoring Easter's joy in worship. I hope you'll be there with us, not just on Easter Sunday, but every Sunday of this season. Let's fill the church with voices raised in praise!

"Allehuia! Now we cry to our King Immortal, who, triumphant, burst the bars of the tomb's dark portal. Come, you faithful, raise the strain of triumphant gladness! God has brought His Israel into joy from sadness!" (LSB #487 v. 5)





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SUNDAY BIBLE STUDY ORIGINAL SIN & FREE WILL

A correct understanding of sin is foundational to understanding the Gospel. The more we come to realize the severity of our condition, the more our appreciation of the Gospel's beauty grows. The Bible tells us that we are "dead in trespasses and sins." This means that salvation must be God's work. In this series of Bible Studies we will let the Formula of Concord (1577) lead us into the Scripture's teaching on Original Sin & Free Will.

We are celebrating! 125 years of Proclaiming the Gospel! We started on January 12, followed by a special service on 0 February 2 with Pastor Keller preaching. Then on March 2 Pastor Jeff V Nehrt preached on Trust in the Lord.

We are not having any special celebrations during the season of R Lent. On Easter Sunday we will proclaim that "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!"

The March 2nd meal will be served by our Board of Christian Education. The plan is to serve the June meal at the t new Taco/Pizza House. A table of mementos will be in the Gathering h Area at different times during the year. Special refrigerator magnets, pens, coloring books, and a very special sketch of our church by Kathy Nichols are available. We are also planning on a couple more special items in the near future. Please stop by and donate for the small items Α and purchase the special sketch for \$10.00.

N Finally, banners are also out for this year of celebrating. The banner on the left is our anniversary banner, made to commemorate this N celebration. The banner on the right side has the official seal of the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod with brief information on the next page of this edition. The balcony banners are designed to be opened one at a time for each of our special anniversary services. V

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This banner has the official LC-MS seal designed by the Reverend A.R. Kretzmann and drawn by Walter Geweke, both of Chicago, which emerged several decades after the synod's founding. It was designed when folks wanted to say a lot in a small space so it needs to be explained to retain any merit.

In the center of the seal, a tongue-like, blue shield represents the Christian's faith. A prominent gold cross on the shield proclaims that we preach Jesus Christ crucified. Rays emanating from the crooks of the cross make it a "Resurrection cross," proclaiming that we also preach Christ risen from the dead. Nearby Latin words declare "Jesus Christus Dominus Est" ("Jesus Christ is Lord"), and three gold crosses symbolize the Holy Trinity. Three gold stars on the shield represent the Apostolic, the Nicene, and the Athanasian Creeds. Six gold stars on a white field stand for the six Lutheran Confessions contained in the 1580 book, "Concordia." Grape vines symbolize Christ's words in John 15:5, "I am the vine; you are the branches." Dividing the white field are the three 'solas' on which Lutheranism is founded: Sola Scriptura, Sola Gratia, Sola Fide (Scripture alone, Grace alone, Faith alone). The exterior circle contains the proper [although grammatically incorrect] name of the church synod and the year it was founded – 1847.

Beneath the shield is Luther's Seal. That particular emblem is, of course, centuries old, and has never been eclipsed by either the synod's logo or its official seal. It is a visual rallying point for a group of confessional Christians who were initially slandered as "Lutherans." We still wear the name with distinction. *Credit: The Art Curmudgeon*



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

The Cross and Passion of Our Lord Are the Hour of His Glory

Deuteronomy 32:36-39

Philippians 2:5-11

Luke 22:1-23:56

The King of Israel comes into His royal glory by the path of humble obedience "to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Phil. 2:8). He "goes as it has been determined" (Luke 22:22), according to the Scriptures, willingly submitting to His Father's plan for the salvation of sinners. "Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name" (Phil. 2:9). His suffering and death open the way of repentance for the forgiveness of sins because He goes to the cross bearing the sins of the world. In His resurrection, God the Father vindicates His people and has compassion on His servants (Deut. 32:36). He kills to make alive; He wounds in order to heal. In remembrance of Him, we praise God, confessing "that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Phil. 2:11).

Let Us Love One Another, as Christ Jesus Has Loved Us

Jeremiah 31:31-34

Hebrews 10:15-25

Luke 22:7-20

By Holy Baptism, "with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water" (Heb. 10:22), we enter the holy place with Jesus. For Jesus is our Passover Lamb who has been sacrificed for us. Christ's Resurrection Is the Firstfruits of the New Creation


Isaiah 65:17-25 1 Corinthians 15:19-26 Luke 24:1-12

The Lord has promised to *"create new heavens and a new earth"* (Is. 65:17), in which His people shall abide in peace and joy. That new creation has begun in the bodily resurrection of Christ Jesus. All the baptized belong to that new creation. Reborn of water and the Holy Spirit, they are *"the offspring of the blessed of the LORD"* (Is. 65:23). The Lord rejoices and is glad in them; He hears and answers their prayers. For *"if in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied"* (1 Cor. 15:19). But Christ Jesus has been raised, *"the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep"* (1 Cor. 15:20). We may be *"perplexed about this"* (Luke 24:4), perhaps even frightened and brought to our knees, because it seems like an *"idle tale"* (Luke 24:11). But faith clings to the Word of Christ and finds His resurrected body — not in the tomb, but in His Holy Supper.

Acts 5:12-20

Revelation 1:4-18

John 20:19-31

On the Lord's Day, St. John the apostle was given a revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ, the incarnate Son of God, the Alpha and Omega, the First and the Last. He is the Living One, *"the firstborn of the dead"* (Rev. 1:5). He died for all people, and behold, He is alive forevermore! Therefore, He has *"the keys of Death and Hades"* (Rev. 1:18). Some of my memories of St. Peter's by Bob Millman

2025 marks the 125th year of the founding of our church. My wife's grandfather, William Miller, was one of the charter members of St. Peter's. The 1st church building cost \$1500 to build in 1900. Several of our senior members were adults who witnessed and participated in many changes over the last 60 + years in our church, all to the glory of God. They surely have many interesting stories to tell, if asked.

Can you remember the steps from the front sidewalk and side doors getting into church? Every entry requires you to climb stairs. Going to church was not handicap accessible.

Can you remember the 3 houses between Elm Street and the church? Over the years the church purchased property (and sometimes paid more than what the property was worth). The 1st house was quickly torn down and made part of the parking lot. The 2nd house was a shot gun house and was emptied and demolished in one day and the remains were put in the park with Park Board's permission. The 3rd house was bigger and better than the first two and was used as a Youth Center and then became the building for our Preschools. Much remodeling both on the inside and outside helped to make our PreSchool a success for many years.

Later, the house on the east side of the church became available. It was purchased and remodeled to meet the state requirements to become the new Day Care Ministry. It lasted until the present-day care was built. The prior daycare ministry property was torn down and the house next to it was purchased and demolished. Today, the property is the east parking lot of the church.

- Between the Daycare and the school, our shelter house was built and a prayer garden with a bubbling fountain, restful benches and many beautiful flowers were constructed. A bad storm caused several limbs to fall in the shelter house and damaged the area, trees were removed and repairs made. This area
 is now a project for further improvement.
- R Can you remember what it was like before our church had air conditioning? Going to church, especially with little ones, was really a challenge. There were hand fans, and the ladies would use them profusely trying to keep cool and quiet to listen to God's Word.
- Later, side fans were added. They stirred the air and messed with women's hair. Soon, after much discussion, it was voted to purchase air conditioning for the church. The 1st AC units had a compressor unit above the sacristy, and it malfunctioned and flooded the entire area. Eventually, the entire church was air conditioned and remains so today.

Another serious problem that took years to fix was the leaky roof over the church offices, side hall and east sanctuary wall. Finally, after years of much trial and error, a rubberized structure was put in the area and the problem was solved.

Can you remember the old 8 pipe rank organ? It lasted many years and finally went kaput. A used organ was found for sale in St. Louis. A committee of us went to St. Louis to the church to remove it from the balcony and loaded it in 2 box trucks and brought it to Brownstown. And an organ restorer from Louisville was hired and revived the organ to an 18-rank pipe organ. It lasted several years until our present organ was purchased.

Can you remember the cry room, hat rack and coat rack in the narthex area?

Can you remember what our church was like before we added the hanging lights? It was difficult on a cloudy morning to read the hymnals and bulletins. The voters did not regret the expense of their installation.

Can you remember our church before the carpet? At 1st, only the altar area, the front and aisles were carpeted. The area under the pews was not. After years of wear, the entire sanctuary was carpeted.

Can you remember the church choir? They sat in front of the church in black robes. Our church had many excellent singers.

Can you remember the time before pew cushions? The pews were hard.

Can you remember when the church ceiling tiles were dark, and the trustees took on the task of painting them? It was truly a team effort, and it really lightened up our church.

Can you remember when we did not have an upstairs restroom? The basement restrooms were hard to get to, especially with little children. Thank God for our upstairs restrooms!


Can you remember when women were not allowed to vote? My mother-in-law, Lillian Miller, was concerned about how only men would make big monetary decisions. When the time came when women could vote, she was reluctant to go to the voter's meeting because she thought her voice wouldn't be heard. But now all members have an equal voice.

One project that was accomplished was putting the insulation in the attic. It paid for itself in one winter, as the bill was almost – cut in half. Ceiling fans were added to push down the heat.

There must be many more memories some of our people have from the past. It would be most interesting to listen and/or read about them. One thing is certain. The changes were blessings from God and His house is now better than ever.

Some of my fond memories of St. Peter's by Margie Millman

- When Pastor Moyer would bring OAFC to the church service and they'd participate in the service.
- Attending Sunday School as a young child and how a large number of kids and adults attended. And sang together in the opening session of Sunday School before being dismissed to their classes.
- Going Christmas caroling in large groups to hospital, nursing homes, and shut ins. We'd all meet back at the church for hot chocolate and cookies. I remember going even as a very young child with Pastor Moyer.
- Having a large paper drive at church to help fundraise for the LCMS Youth Gathering in Denver.
- Having a talent show in the basement and Pastor Belk and 2 other men dressed up as the Pointer Sisters to help fundraise for our Youth Gathering.
- Having an auction and I made cakes for fundraising. The church was very supportive.
- Having a large youth group, making many friends, and participating in lots of activities.
- Participating in 10 Christmas Eve services from a young child through 8th grade and getting a bag of peanuts, fruit, and candy after the service. Weekend practices at church in December.
- Helping with Ladies Aid and L.W.M.L. fundraising with my mom and grandma.
- As a young child, Pastor Moyer would give me a hug every Sunday after church.
- Singing in the children's choir and playing the handbells





